Narrative:

The *Dey Brothers Building* was acquired by the City of Syracuse in 1992. The City of Syracuse responding to a request for Proposal from the Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation, was awarded the contract to lease 110,000 square feet of 'High-Tech' telecommunications office space in the newly named '*Dey's Centennial Plaza*.'

The main structure of 210,000 square feet is the original *Dey Brothers Building* designed by the Architect, Archimedes Russell. The building is constructed of grey pressed brick with Perth Amboy terra cotta trimmings in the same color. The facade is characteristic of the Second Renaissance Revival Style as exhibited by the flat-roofed, six story, rectangular building.

The *Dey's Centennial Plaza* possesses a level of architectural detailing and articulation that is evident of Syracuse's rich heritage of historic building. Removal of the 1969 amorphous marble facade has unveiled this splendor, creating a major impact and force in the continuing downtown revitalization process.
